# **NEWS FROM PAGHAM PARISH COUNCIL**

I believe that most residents of Pagham and Nyetimber are only too aware that the overdevelopment of Pagham is now under way. The first developers and all their contractors moved into Summer Lane in 2020 and have now departed having apparently completed the building works, the surface water drainage and a green open space with children's playground.

Unfortunately, few if any developers on this scale manage to leave the site that they promised to develop with care and consideration and in an improved state for those who already live nearby or in one of the new houses. We await with everincreasing doubts that Summer Lane will ever be left as a good environment to live in.

The original residents of Summer Lane all have their horror stories of how they suffered once the builders arrived. However, none of us expected to have been left with incomplete surface water drainage that has caused ongoing problems. A children's playground that is incomplete and has an asbestos dump underneath it. And a green space that has trees and shrubs planted but no grass nor hard surface pathways for disabled access, despite the earlier promises. There is now a modification being accepted to remove the lighting bollards and replace them with benches after comments from PCC that the playground for small children is unlikely to be needed in the dark.

We had hoped that the commencement of work at Sefter Road and Hook Lane would be with lessons learnt with regard to problems caused for existing residents. Arun District Council are in a position to oversee working arrangements at the site, and in theory, the developers submit plans as to how the site will be managed and operated to ensure the working conditions that they filed with Arun, prior to commencement, are obeyed. Unfortunately, this is wishful thinking on our part. The list of needless aggravations caused by the contractors grows longer by the week. Dust control and speed limits are apparently not working, generators keep lights on all night, bank holidays are working days on site, noisy work starts before 7.00am in the mornings and there are even reports that alfresco toilets are preferred by some site attendees rather than the Portaloos provided! These are all matters which were proscribed in the management plan but ignored by the actual operatives. On top of all of this the heavy lorry traffic was supposed to avoid Hook Lane, but didn't.

We have asked for updates to be able to understand that the site is being properly and adequately monitored by Arun District Council but receive no updates and even though we were advised that the Health and Safety department had the work under review, nothing changes and so we are still pressing for information and action if appropriate.

P.S. please note that at the next General Election Pagham will no longer be in the Bognor constituency. It will be voting for the MP to be elected in Chichester. This is under the Boundaries Commission new rules, but does not come into effect until the next election.

#### TIM'S GARDENING TIPS

With apologies to the noble Bard, it's autumn so, 'To mulch, or not to mulch, that is the question?'. It's an argument I have had with fellow gardeners, and like anything, views differ. First of all - let's understand what we're talking about here. Mulching is the application of a good layer of organic matter to the borders and vegetable plots, all with a view to achieving a number of things.

It helps to replenish nutrients lost to plants over the previous year. It can suppress weeds, help to retain moisture and warmth in the soil beneath and can protect roots from winter frosts. Some say mulch now, now, now. Others say 'Woah there Nelly, calm your boots, wait until spring'. Me, I'm in the latter camp, Spring time is mulching time.

My first priority is maintaining the nutrient levels in the soil ready for the new seedlings, and if I mulch now, there is a strong chance those nutrients will have depleted before I've even sown my seeds, yet alone transplanted the seedlings. I leave the mulching process as late as possible in the spring to ensure the ground has warmed up sufficiently, and given the dampness of the first quarter of the year, I know the mulch will also be keeping some moisture in the earth.

Conversely, if we have a hot, hot spring, any mulch laid in the autumn can become so dry and dusty that it is no good to man or beast. Instead, water the earth before laying a spring mulch. But let's be clear, there is really only one deciding factor, personal preference. And there-in lies the beauty of gardening, doing things the way you want to, the way you may have been doing for years and years.

Everyone aged 70 - 79 years is eligible for the vaccination and now a newly available vaccine is offered for those aged 65 - 70 after 1<sup>st</sup> September 2023.

You can get shingles more than once, so it's important to get vaccinated even if you've already had it.
