TIM'S GARDENING TIPS

Spring 2024

I love spring. There is so much joy in venturing back out into the garden, blinking into the sunshine, after the months of hibernation. And, call me odd, there is one particular spring job I love doing around this time... pruning rose bushes. It's all about cutting away diseased, dead or damaged growth, creating an open centre to allow air movement and ensuring there are no crossing or rubbing stems. That open centre can be a real boom to preventing disease, especially fungal disease. However, the rose question I am asked most by visitors to the garden at Crouchers Hotel, is how to stop black spot.

It's the most serious fungal disease of roses, and is caused by water-borne spores, causing the black spots on leaves, that eventually turn yellow and drop. It can also cause a loss of vigour via stem lesions and, let's face it, is not pretty to look at. Treatment is not a straight-forward matter. Removing affected leaves and stems can help, but the spores are constantly brought in on the wind.

There are chemical treatments, but they can be harsh, and either need applying prior to infection (difficult given the continual attack by spores), or repeatedly over a number of weeks. I've heard some people use a one-part milk, two-part water mixture in a spray bottle, and apply it each week - does it work? Let me know! Another approach is buying cultivars that are resistant to the disease - but this is no guarantee and most supposedly resistant cultivars will succumb over the years.

But as gardeners, we all endure the endless battle with the elements, the infections and the pests - but still, it's spring, and we're out in the sunshine once again, so it's not all bad.

PAGHAM PARISH COUNCIL

The very wet winter that we are currently experiencing has brought into sharp focus the dangers of building large numbers of houses on a flood plain. The developers and the District Council are both suffering from the excessive rainfall. The lack of adequate infrastructure and roads with adequate surface water drainage is continuously showing up in the floods that regularly close roads. The drainage of the peninsula using the network of manmade rifes must always be maintained in good condition by all residents and landowners. Sadly this is not always the case today.

The developers are slowly suffering from a lack of district and regional planning that considers the local geology on low lying land at the foot of porous hills and the emergence of springs and streams controlled by the pressure from water being added at the top of a hill and flowing naturally down to the sea. Your Parish Council has been concerned about these issues for many years and is continuing to pressure the local planning authorities, not least in the area of surface water management and the provision for sensible developments that include sufficient provision for winters like this one. The current building at Hook Lane is a classic case of planners not controlling development to protect both current residents and future new house owners. The site still does not have fully approved designs for surface water management; it can be done later is the defence. If it had been provided and built before the houses, then it would not be the flooding problem that they are currently experiencing.

There is now an application before Arun District Council to delay the signoff of the surface water drainage plan from before occupation of the first property to before occupation of the last of the 300 houses. The development in Summer Lane last year had a similar problem with the lack of capacity at the local sewage works. The solution was to dig a very large tank at the end of the estate to collect it all and have tankers weekly taking loads to other sewage works in the county. Again no infrastructure planning to cope with the essential provision required by new housing.

Parish Councils only have advisory capability in these matters, the real power comes from individual residents. As householders we need to report what is happening on the ground to those in authority behind desks in their offices. If your road is flooded **REPORT IT** to West Sussex County Council

on their web site and keep reporting it. If you have a problem with mess, noise and general disturbance of your life by builders **REPORT IT** to Arun District Council via their web site and don't give up if the problem is ongoing keep reporting it. If the street drains where you live are blocked or floods of water appear on your estate roads **REPORT IT** to Southern Water Authority. They need to know. We are all guilty of saying someone should do something. It should be each of us if we had been more aware and reported more often what distressed us the authorities would not get away with such tragedies as the tipping of raw sewage all over our rivers and shores.

We at Pagham Parish Council continue to defend the village from as many of the poor planning decisions that we are handed by Arun District Council. In the last few months we successfully challenged the decision of ADC to allow builders to bury asbestos waste under the extension to the village open space on Summer Lane. To the extent that at a meeting with Arun and the developers it was determined that the whole scheme must be redesigned, and new plans entered for approval. This should include proper drainage and the lowering of the ground levels

FINALLY, ENHANCING THE VILLAGE ENVIRONMENT

The non-strategic developments that are going ahead do mean that some funding from the developers will come to the Parish Council. They are to be spent over the ensuing 5 years on village enhancement. This can take the form of simple tree planting schemes and permanent landscape, to sports facilities e.g. tennis courts. As your Parish Council we wish to ensure that this funding is spent to increase the village assets, services and/or environment; reflect the wishes of some or all residents. The council wishes to receive ideas from residents that can be considered for development over the next 5 years. *To quote from the regulations:*

- providing, replacing, improving, operating or maintaining infrastructure that supports development in the area; or
- anything else concerned with addressing the demands that development places on the area.
